Editorial

As we have been coming out of lockdown and trying to work out what the 'new normal' looks like, West Wilts BKA has been hit with a few significant quakes.

The whole County BKA (including West Wilts BKA as a constituent branch) are trying to decide whether to change to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation so that we could be recognised as a charity. This could bring significant benefits, but also brings some significant hurdles and constraints. We can get benefit in that we should be able to claim Gift Aid on the membership fees of suitable tax-paying members, but in order to do so, there are limits on our reserve budgets and our controlling paperwork must be in the best state. Of course, having our controlling paperwork 'in order' is a good thing, so long as it is meaningful and workable, and a reasonable reserve budget makes sense – we believe the fantastic efforts that have been put in place across the county have ensured this and it is all heading in the right direction.

All of this sounds a bit serious for a hobby beekeeping branch, but the trouble does not stop there. We had issues recruiting a new Apiary Manager for the Branch and our time at the current site was becoming limited. We had also outgrown the facilities there. We were faced with a serious set of questions: Did we try to keep Town Farm going with no permanent Manager? Did we close the Branch Apiary with the absence of an Apiary Manager and just 'do without' an Apiary? Did we try to move the Apiary somewhere else? We felt uneasy with the first two options and could not see them as tenable. A search was undertaken to look for a new site and a new Manager. Both of these came along and we are looking to moving to a new site. The decision has been made to try to move the Apiary by Spring 2022 and the agreement was given at the Annual General Meeting to spend most of the Branch Reserves to buy and start to equip a new facility – we will provide more detail as the project develops to this rather sporting timescale.

As far as a future lecture programme is concerned, we hope to have a hybrid of virtual and in-person meetings. We haven't booked any speakers at the moment with so much going on, but the talks will start again in the New Year.

So, this first edition is quite lengthy and has some rather serious elements, but we hope that it will soften a bit over the coming months. As we get the first taste of some frosts in the morning, I have avoided the obligatory photo of an apiary under snow to remind you there is better weather ahead. I hope you enjoy this, find it informative and please let us know what you think. This first edition of the new format also has the details for the Branch Annual Dinner – we also hope you'll take this opportunity to come along for a nice meal and some friendly chat and we can get started on the business of keeping bees and away from the intricacies of running a club.

Need to know

Apiary Move

The branch has had a long and excellent existence at its current site, however a number of factors that have come to bear that means our continued residency there is uncertain and we had been struggling for some time to find an Apiary Manager. As a result, the branch took the difficult decision at the AGM to move sites. This was difficult for several reasons – no move is an easy decision, especially when it involves bees, the move requires some action and significant expenditure to get a site that will meet our needs for the foreseeable future. The move will also include substantial effort in getting a new facility together that is safe, secure and accessible, as well as a new base where we can encourage the art and craft of beekeeping.

Time is not on our side as we need to get the new storage and training facility established on the new site by mid-January to ensure the bees can move to their new home in peace and quiet. We have

therefore created a small project team. After the initial capital outlay agreed at the AGM, much of the work will need to be done on a self-help basis - so we will be calling for volunteers to assist. The first call to arms is for an electrician or experienced DIY member who would be prepared to assist with fitting the electrical wiring, lights and sockets in the new facility. We will try to keep you up to speed in the coming weeks on this exciting club project with more detailed plans about how we plan to use this new facility for West Wilts BKA members.

Charitable Status

Wiltshire BKA still has a working group to determine the best way forward for charitable status for the County and Local Branches. There will be developments over the coming months which will come to you as members for a decision. Without a charitable status the County association and local branches will not be able to claim Gift Aid, however there are several hurdles that need to be undertaken first, such as membership agreement to change status, the identification of Trustees and ensuring all the controlling paperwork is in order. None of this change is a trivial activity and, even if members do not decide to change the clubs to a charitable status, the paperwork should be in a better state for the future. The first step for West Wilts BKA is to hold a Special General Meeting on 7th January at Bratton Jubilee Hall (at 7pm). Please try to attend if you can.

Please watch this space and email communications as Wilts BKA and West Wilts BKA work on the proposals and we will come back to you with further information as things develop. We hope to know a lot more in January and February 2022.

Newsletter

How we get it to people

We will send it using the BBKA ER2 email system. There are many assumptions in this approach including:

- The system works and it is judged compliant with all of the relevant rules and regulations (this is the responsibility of BBKA).
- Your contact details are correct (and of course if your contact details aren't correct at the moment, you won't have got this!), so we ask you try to keep your details up to date and if you don't hear from us for a while, it may be that your details are incorrect (of course it could be our plans have failed to send out regular newsletters!).
- You can receive this, but you don't get told: so, if you have an overactive spam filter you may need to check whether this comes from a recognised email address (I am afraid that this is more on you again, sorry!).

The advantage of this is that a lot of Data Protection hurdles are out of West Wilts BKA hands and we, as a branch, have taken all reasonable precautions.

Training

As you may be aware from the Annual General Meeting we have changed training coordinator. We already have a couple of courses planned in the coming months, both starting in mid-February.

Introduction to Beekeeping – the Beginners' Course 2022

Our beginners' course starts on Tuesday 22nd February and runs for 6 weeks at Larkrise Community Farm, West Ashton Road, Trowbridge (between 7 – 9 pm) for the class room sessions and a further 2 weeks practical sessions at our new Apiary on Saturday 2nd and 9th April (in the afternoon). The practical sessions are weather dependent and could be subject to slight change.

We have 7 tutors presenting theory and practical subjects and following the BBKA Guide to Beekeeping covering bees, hives, equipment, the beekeeping year, swarming, pests and diseases, getting started and much more.

Handling the bees at the Apiary using our equipment and bee suits will give the confidence to begin a fascinating journey into the hive and the life of the honey bee.

The cost of the beginner's course is £75 which included BBKA and branch membership.

Basic Assessment Study Group

This is a group which any one can join after they have kept their own bees for at least 12 months.

The intention is to reinforce/improve your knowledge sufficiently to take the Basic Assessment in the summer months (you don't have to take the assessment unless you want to).

Some beekeepers will use the course as a refresher or improvers Course.

Together we will work our way through the Syllabus and more over the 6 sessions starting in mid-February.

We will then follow with 2 practical sessions at the Apiary.

On completing the course, I am sure you will be able to take the assessment which opens the door to future study and BBKA modules.

Anyway, it's fun to talk to fellow beekeepers on a mixture of subjects as we learn more about our bees.

WWBKA AGM - 12th November 2021
