David Newell sent the above photograph for the newsletter - a photo of an Asian hornet trap showing a 'Gardapis' trap set in Dilton Marsh – in an ideal location (i.e. sunny, sheltered from wind, easy to monitor, etc.). At the time the photo was taken David says it had been in place for a fortnight but has caught nothing at that point. During recent high winds, the trap was buffeted a lot and one very windy day, the dish of attractant became detached from the 'stirrup' in which it was suspended. The attractant was still OK (because the 'trappit' was mainly absorbed into a 'wick') so it would still have been doing its job.

A visit to Golden Island Apiary Malta.

I like to visit different apiaries when I get the chance - so when I booked a holiday to visit Malta I looked on the internet to see whether I could locate a friendly beekeeper who would allow me to talk bees and look into their apiary. I found Golden Island Honey and More and contacted Ray Sciberras. Set up in April 2008, Honey and More Golden Island Limited manages apiaries in Malta and Gozo and produces quality Maltese honey and other beehive products. Ray is committed to educating schoolchildren and the general public about bees and the importance of them in our world.

We exchanged a few messages and finally, on a bright day in April (1st to be precise) I had the privilege of joining Ray on one of his apiary sites on the island of Malta. Ray (an industrial chemist in the "superyacht" sector in a "previous life") currently has I50 hives all over the island. Striving to be innovative and sustainable Ray places several hives within Heritage Malta sites, thus promoting Malta's historical link to honey.



Ray explained that he harvests an enormous 7 tonnes of honey each year - that is a lot of honey! This honey is sold in a variety of markets and outlets (including Holland and Barrett in Malta). In 2022 Ray won Gold Medals in the London International Honey Awards and Paris International Honey Awards with his summer (wild thyme) and autumn carob and eucalyptus honeys. His apiaries produce three harvests annually – spring (multifloral from borage, clover, citrus and wild thistle), summer (monofloral – wild thyme), and autumn (multifloral – carob and eucalyptus).

(Contd...A visit to Golden Island Apiary Malta)

This year the weather has so far been rather unpredictable (like ours in UK!) Ray tells me there has been little rain in Malta and the bees need feeding. Ray inserts a feeder into the frame space and at the moment is feeding them 50:50 sugar and water solution. When I asked Ray about the Oriental Hornet (different to the Asian Hornet) problem, he explained that he used electrical shocking harps as protection against them.

The weather had been rather windy for a few days prior to my visit to one of Ray's apiaries and it was still a little breezy when we opened up a few of the hives on a site quite close to St Paul's Bay. The bees were very active, and it was obvious that they needed to be fed.

We spent some time talking "bees" and looking inside the hives. After we had "closed up" the hives Ray invited us to taste honey from three different harvests, Spring, Summer, and Autumn. My favourite was the wild thyme - Summer.

In addition to harvesting and selling Maltese honey, Golden Island Honey produces infused honeys, propolis tinctures, beeswax candles and a wide range of traditional products, jams, pates, and conserves based on local fruits and produce.







Ray presented us with bottles of his mead products for us to try - a mead, a prickly pear infused mead and a carob bean infused mead, My favourite was the prickly pear mead. Ray explained that the prickly pear mead used some of the remaining pulp from making the prickly pear conserve – I can confirm this mead is an excellent "by product" – good recycling idea there!

(Contd...A visit to Golden Island Apiary Malta)

At the end of our visit Ray dropped us off in the vicinity of a Roman apiary and we made our way up the scree in the warm sunshine to the site. Malta has always been known for its first-class honey; some even maintain that the name MELITA (Latin for Malta) is formed from the word MEL, which in Latin means honey.



Most apiaries were built facing south - an orientation beekeepers chose for maximum light and warmth needed by bees. The apiary is sectioned into alcoves, each containing two stone shelves, with a terracotta beehive behind each hole. The hives are lying on their sides with the neck right behind the outside hole. If the swarm was too large for the hive, an extension was added.

Question: Do you like your honey - what do you do with it? **Answer**: My family enjoys having honey with their tea, or porridge.

Question: What has been the most useful tip given to you that you would like to pass on? **Answer:** Even if you don't want a lot of hives, have at least 2, it improves your chances of solving your own problems.

Gloria remembers a particular "bee related" event - she says

"When I was on the beginners course, my instructor got a swarm call in the middle of an apiary session. Well... this person thought he had a small swarm on a tree and called for help with swarm collection.

Minutes later, multiple cars pulled up in front of his house to a screeching halt, 8 people, in full bee suits, jumped out. All (except the instructors) looking highly excited, pointing, gesturing. I was given the rookie job of knocking on doors (only trying to borrow a ladder), but from a distance that must have looked quite alarming too!

Can you imagine the face of the homeowner .. not to mention his neighbours...."

Plants for pollinators.

It is not too late to plant seeds for pollinators. If you are interested in this subject perhaps you would like to take a look at the RHS website using the following link on your computers. Plants for Pollinators advice and downloadable lists / RHS Gardening You will find downloadable pdf files on the subjects of Garden Plants, Wildflowers and Plants of the world.

The RHS website gives information suggesting other ways of helping pollinators by


- Allowing lawn 'weeds' to flower by mowing less often. Dandelions for instance are an invaluable food source for many pollinators
- Providing water for pollinators
- Avoiding the use of pesticides wherever possible and never spraying open flowers
- Providing nest sites for wild bees

You will find a list of organic nurseries on the RHS website if that is where your particular interest lays.

As members of WWBKA it is likely that you are already familiar with the British Beekeepers Association website, have you noticed that there is a section for "Planting For Pollinators" there? You can access this page by using the following link Planting for Pollinators | British Beekeepers Association (bbka.org.uk). There you can download a leaflet "Ten favourite Flowers for small gardens to attract Honey Bees" Download.ashx (bbka.org.uk)

It is not necessary to have a big garden to plant to support pollinators – you can find seeds to suit all sorts of different growing positions – sunny, shaded, dry and damp included. Just a few pots by your front or back door will be well received by a range of insects. One of the most important things to remember is to make sure your plants have sufficient water, keeping them by the front or back door is a way of noticing how they are looking when you pass them. Any spare little areas can be raked over, seeds added and watered – many communities are allowing roadside verges to flower without being cut during the summer months as opposed to the neatly mowing the edges. If you are not somebody who considers themselves to be a gardener – buy a couple of packets of seeds and have a go – seeds make great gifts for children, and it is one way of raising interest in gardening and insects in the next generation.
